STATE PLANS TO EXCESS MANY ACRES AT CREEDMOOR PSYCHIATRIC CENTER

The Empire State Development Corp (ESD) of New York State is reaching out to the Bellerose/Queens Village communities concerning the redevelopment of the Creedmoor Hospital campus. The office of Queens Borough President Donovan Richards is also involved in the conversation.

On November 9, representatives from the Queens Civic Congress met with Vicky Garvey, the Borough President's Director of Planning and Development. One of the first steps will be the development of a Community Advisory Council (CAC) comprised of community leaders who will give input on the usage of the property. The CAC is expected to begin meeting in the late spring or early summer. A series of public meetings will also take place.

Civic leaders and community members have already made some recommendations. A basic theme would be for the development to fit in with the character and density of the surrounding community. Another general theme would be a submission to the State and/or National Registry of Historic Places to recognize and preserve any relevant buildings.

Some specific recommendations that have come from the community:

- A Veterans Affairs auxiliary care facility to support area veterans
- A public school to relieve overcrowding of local schools
- Faculty housing for local colleges
- A community center, possibly a combined center for seniors and youth
- Park or open space, part of the Queens Greenway We will keep civic members informed of future developments.

A hot potato that has been kicked down the road for years seems finally on the docket for a solution. For years there have been complaints and lawsuits over what is perceived to be an unfair application of formulas for determining a property's real estate tax.

New York City Comptroller Brad Lander is determined to tackle this issue. This has owners of single-family homes holding their breath as it has been alleged for years that single family homes pay less than their fair share, and that owners of older homes pay less than owners of newer homes. Creedmoor Civic's single-family homes are very close to being 100 years old.

The City's budget has been ballooning over the years, but the City has avoided increasing the real estate tax rate because the assessed valuation has been increasing in a tight real estate market. So, without raising the rates, the City collects higher and higher tax revenues from its private sector properties.

The Queens Civic Congress has been on top of this, holding a Zoom meeting with Brad Lander. The QCC is prepared to send a delegation to Albany to lobby this issue if necessary to protect homeowners. It may mean grandfathering in current homeowners, putting caps on increases in any one year, etc.

The year 2022 has been a busy year for the Creedmoor Civic Association. The following is a month-by-month summary of interesting news and events. JANUARY

Newsletter: Concrete Plaza to be Transformed Into Environmental Garden.
